Picking elective subjects for 2019

All students entering year 9 or 10 in 2019 should have recieved their elective selection booklet and their elective selection form for 2019 this week. If not, ask your child to come to the administration office and collect theirs or get a new one.

Students and parents should be aware that some course classes are limited and places will be confirmed upon reciept of completed forms and 50% deposit where a course requires payment by Wednesday 7 November 2018.

If your form and/or deposit is not finalised by the due date, student's will be placed in a non-fee paying course at the school's discretion

The final balance of fees is due by Friday 8 March 2019. Once a deposit has been paid, fees can be paid in smaller amounts if that suits your financial situation as long as they are paid in full by the due date.

Year 10 into year 11 final subject selections

Students entering year 11 in 2019 recieved their final subject selection form last week. This document is very important as this indicates the subjects they will study for their HSC preliminary year in 2019 and their HSC year in 2020.

Forms need to be returned by Wednesday 6 September 2018.

Students and parents should be aware that some courses attract a fee. Completed forms and 50% deposit where a course requires payment must be returned by Friday 19 October 2018.

Should no payment or arrangment for payment be made by this date, the student will be placed in an alternative non-fee payable course on that particular line.

Student assistance application forms are available from the administartion office for families in need of financial support, for more information contact the school on 02 6729 1000.

If your child has not given you their form ask them to come to the administration office and collect their form or get a new one.

White Card

White Card - Work, Health and Safety Ticket Course will be running at Warialda High School on Tuesday 18 September commencing at 9:00 AM and will finish at approximately 3:15 PM.

The course will be run by Community College Northern Inland (CCNI) and the cost is \$140. The course is open to any person 14 years and over.

The ticket is very important for anybody who wants to increase their chance of picking up work in the construction industry. This means any job where something is being built or repaired such as cleaning out a drain on a farm, repairing a grain shed or cattle yards, putting up a TV aerial, helping tidy up for a builder, working for the shire.

It is very useful for those students who are looking for casual work and it can be used in other states. Students who go to the city to go to university, TAFE or just to get work will often the difference of getting the job or not and to earn some quick moneyto pay the rent or bills.

When you enrol you will need to have a Unique Student Identifier (USI), this is applied for online by searching www.usi.gov/students/create-yourusi. You will need this for any course that you apply to do, so keep your USI in a safe place.










Asthma impacts most Australians

Two-thirds of Australians are impacted by asthma. Most people know 1 of the 2.5 million Australians who have been diagnosed with asthma. You probably know someone with asthma.

Fact Two

Asthma is a long term disease

Asthma can develop at any age, even adulthood. Most people don't grow out of asthma – even though 1 person in 4 may think that but it can be managed with medication.

Asthma is a life-threatening disease $\cdot M$

More than 400 people die because of asthma each year. The right medication, knowledge, and a written Asthma Action Plan can help keep asthma under control. Almost 1 person in every 3 don't realise asthma is life-threatening.

Asthma triggers are varied and include pollen, smoke, physical activity and exercise, colds and flus and thunderstorms.

Most people know that asthma has many common triggers, including pollen, smoke, physical activity, and viruses. But are you 1 out of every 2 Australians who know that thunderstorms can trigger asthma flare-ups? Everybody experiences asthma differently.

Using an asthma preventer every day is the best way to reduce asthma symptoms and flare-ups.

Using preventers each day reduces symptoms of asthma and flare-ups for most people. These medications mimic the body's natural response. Only 1 in 4 people under 24 years old know this. Preventers are the mainstay of asthma management and we want everyone to know.

Did you know?

- 1 in 8 women living in NSW will develop breast cancer in their lifetime
- Mammograms (breast x-rays) can detect cancers the size of a grain of rice, long before they can be seen or felt by you or your doctor.
- A BreastScreen NSW appointment is free and takes around 20 minutes.
- You do not need a referral from your doctor but we encourage you to bring your doctor's details to your appointment.



About BreastScreen NSW

BreastScreen NSW is a free breast screening program with over 200 locations in NSW. The program is especially **recommended for women aged 50 to 74 years**. However, all women over the age of 40 are eligible for screening through the program.

The receptionist will collect your completed registration and consent forms and explain the screening process to you. The female radiographer will take you into the private x-ray room where you can remove your top and bra.

During your mammogram the radiographer will take at least two x-rays of each breast. Your breast will be firmly compressed for about 10 seconds while the x-ray image is taken. This compression may be uncomfortable, but is only for a brief time.

If you feel any discomfort, inform your radiographer. You can stop the mammogram at any time.

Can I have a mammogram if I am younger than 50 or older than 74?

All women aged 40 and over can contact BreastScreen NSW for a free mammogram.

BreastScreen NSW mammograms are not available for women under 40. Breast screening is not as effective in younger women due to denser breast tissue, which makes it harder to see small cancers on a mammogram.

BreastScreen NSW recommends that all women be breast aware. You should consult your doctor immediately if you notice any changes in your breast or have any questions or concerns.

What are the limitations of a mammogram?

A mammogram is the best way of detecting breast cancer early but, like other screening tests, is not 100% accurate.

Not all cancers will be detected through screening. Some cancers cannot be seen on a mammogram or can develop during the time between mammograms. There is also a small chance that a cancer could be missed on a mammogram.

A mammogram may also detect abnormalities in the breast tissue which need further tests, but may not turn out to be cancer.

Most breast cancers found through BreastScreen NSW would grow and be life-threatening if not treated. However, some breast cancers that are found and treated may not have become lifethreatening. At this time, it is not possible to tell exactly which breast cancers are life-threatening and which breast cancers may not be.

How safe is a mammogram?

13 20 50

20 minutes every 2 years could save your life

> As with any x-ray, a very low amount of radiation is needed when taking a mammogram. Research shows the benefits of having a mammogram to find breast cancer early far outweigh any possible risks from radiation.

Be breast aware in between appointments.

- Get to know your breasts and what is normal for you. Look at your breasts in the mirror and feel your breasts regularly.
- If you notice any changes in your breasts (i.e. lumps, nipple discharge or persistent new breast pain) see your doctor straight away.

What is a mammogram?

A mammogram is an x-ray of a woman's breasts. BreastScreen NSW mammograms are for women who have not noticed any symptoms or changes in their breasts.

Our screening services are equipped with state of the art equipment, ensuring the highest quality mammograms with minimal radiation dose.



Should I have a mammogram?

The choice to be screened is yours. However, BreastScreen NSW recommends women aged 50 to 74 years have **a mammogram every two years**.

Mammograms can show very small breast cancers before they can be seen or felt. The earlier a breast cancer is found, the better a woman's chance of survival.

What happens at a mammogram?

Your appointment will take approximately 20 minutes.
