### Shakespeare's MacBeth excursion

On the 6th of September, myself and four of the Year 11 Advanced English students travelled to Sydney to attend the Pop-Up Globe Theatre in Moore Park – as well as explore other cultural opportunities the city afforded.

Paige Delanty has recalled the experience of the students had on the night we arrived, as they attended an historically accurate production of Shakespeare's tumultuous tragedy, MacBeth.

When we arrived at the Globe Theatre the atmosphere was filled with excitement as we stepped into the Shakespearean era. There were different levels to the theatre to reflect the different social groups that would have attended the theatre during the 16th century: the groundlings, lower, middle, and upper galleries – we were seated in the lower gallery. We had small cushions on a bench seating, but the groundlings had to stand in a pit just below the stage where they were given the experience of having fake blood and props from the play thrown at them by the actors. When walking into the outdoor theatre the air was filled with smoke and there were bagpipes playing to add to the 'Shakespearean' effect, and eerie Scottish setting of the play. The actors were all dressed in costumes that are associated with this era and the play itself was spoken in Shakespearean English. Overall, the play MacBeth was produced to a quality where the audience was constantly engaged as it was very interactive and unpredictable.

On the morning of the 7th, we were privileged with an exclusive behind-the-scenes tour of the iconic Sydney Opera House, as Sarah Miller explains:

The tour of the Sydney Opera House was extremely informative and a great experience. We got to see what went on behind the stages and we learnt all about the creation and ideas behind the design of the Opera House. Throughout the tour we learnt about the true extent of the preparation and organising that goes on before and after the performances, as well as how many people contribute to help the shows run as smoothly as possible. Yet our guides highlighted the numerous issues they face when staging the wide variety of events

hosted at the Opera House, which need an open mind and quick thinking to overcome. We have all found an appreciation for the work that goes into every performance, especially considering that on any one day they can have three performances that means a lot of things to organise and a lot of things that can go wrong.

After the tour, the girls and I were keen for something to eat and to see more of Sydney. From the Opera House we explored the centre of historic Sydney – The Rocks. Emma Weatherall has written an overview of what the students learnt (and ate) at this significant place in Australia's colonial history.

On Friday we spent the morning walking around The Rocks, which













is a very historic part of Sydney and still has old houses and laneways that convicts built when Sydney was being colonised. The Rocks are located near Circular Quay and in the shadow of the Harbour Bridge. We walked around the markets, buying and sampling tasty treats from a variety of street stall – especially the fudge. After exploring some of the key historical sites, including the old shipping warehouses, street front, houses, and Customs House; we then walked to 'Pancakes on The Rocks' – a restaurant that solely serves pancakes! There are sweet and savoury dishes, with endless options to pick from. After we all ate our way into a food coma, we walked back into the heart of Sydney where we saw traditional wood-block roads and narrow laneways.

Once we had finished at The Rocks, I decided to take the students to the State Library of NSW on Elizabeth Street. This magnificent building sets a high standard for libraries, containing several specialised reading rooms, a vast collection of books and resources, and not to mention the beautiful sandstone façade and entrance room. Dakota Perrett describes what it was like to visit the library for the first time:

The State Library was an amazing experience as we had never seen a library that big before. It was interesting to see how the library itself has adapted over the years to fit in with modern day technologies and resources. It gave us an amazing insight into how the library used to work as well as looking at some of the historical artefacts that had been donated.

It was difficult to choose only four highlights from the trip as there were numerous experiences and

learning opportunities for the students to enjoy – including an electrical storm that washed out our second play. Despite this, our whirlwind trip to Sydney allowed the students to gain a greater understanding of the significance of Shakespeare, and his plays, to our current world. It also allowed them to partake in activities our rural setting can sometimes be a barrier to, and inspire them as they prepare to undertake their final year at school.

I would like to thank Mrs Young for making this trip possible, as well as Mrs La Fontaine, Mrs Bell, and Mrs Williams for their support in organising this excursion.

## 2019 Harding Miller Scholarship Applications Open

The Harding Miller Education Foundation was established in 2015 and is a registered charity providing scholarships to Australian girls studying in government high schools. Scholarships are valued at up to \$20,000 over up to 4 years and include a laptop and a trip to the Public Education Foundation Awards Night in the first year.

Annually, recipients also receive mobile data, remote helpdesk support, \$2000 worth of face-to-face tutoring, online homework help, a \$600 gift card for school expenses and a personal coach to help them make the most of their scholarship. The scholarships are awarded based on the dual criteria of high academic potential and experiencing socio-economic disadvantage.

To be eligible students must be an Australian citizen or permanent resident and be studying Year 9 in 2019. Applications are now open and will close on 28 September 2018.
